



# Ringing World National Youth Contest

## Young ringers to make big noise in York

The 3rd annual Ringing World National Youth Contest will take place in York on Saturday July 6 2013. Sixteen teams of young bellringers from across England will compete for the Whitechapel Trophy. The contest itself will be held on the eight bells at St Lawrence's church, Lawrence Street, whilst the competitors and their supporters will also be able to ring the bells at other churches across the city centre.

The headquarters for the day will be St Helen's church, on the corner of Stonegate and Davygate, where a miniature ring of bells will be erected especially for the event. Ringing will also take place at St Martin-le-Grand, Coney Street, All Saints', North Street, St Olave's, Marygate and St Wilfrid's, Duncombe Place, whilst a series of Treasure Hunt-style clues will lead participants around the city sights.

All 128 competitors are aged 18 or under. Two of the sixteen teams are representing areas of Yorkshire, and other entrants are travelling from as far afield as the Isle of Wight and Gloucestershire. The contest is being judged by Simon Linford, a well-known expert bellringer from Birmingham, along with three accomplished young York-based ringers, Helen Beaumont, David Leese and Ryan Mills. The results and presentation ceremony will take place at 5.15pm in St Michael-le-Belfrey, Deangate.
